

Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) – Conflict

ETC Situation Report #4

Reporting period 16/06/18 to 21/09/18

The Emergency Telecommunications Cluster (ETC) in the Democratic Republic of Congo was activated on 20 November 2017. Under the global leadership of the World Food Programme (WFP), the ETC is coordinating the ICT response with government, the private sector and humanitarian partners on the ground.

Highlights

- The Emergency Telecommunications Cluster (ETC) continues to provide shared security telecommunications services support humanitarian operations in the Kasai region, South Kivu and Tanganyika.
- Given the recent Ebola outbreak in Beni (North-Kivu), the World Health Organization (WHO), leading the Ebola response, has formally requested the support from the ETC to evaluate Information Communications and Technology (ICT) needs in affected areas. The ETC conducted an assessment mission in North-Kivu jointly with WHO.

Situation Overview

The Ministry of Health in DRC along with humanitarian organizations are responding to an Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) outbreak since 1 August 2018, with the epicenter being Mangina town in Mabalako Health Zone, North Kivu Province, in the east of the country. Confirmed cases have also been reported from Beni Health Zone (North Kivu Province) and Mandima Health Zone (Ituri Province).

The Ministry of Health, in collaboration with humanitarian organizations monitoring and investigating alerts in other provinces in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and in neighboring countries.

North Kivu and Ituri are among the most populated provinces in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. North Kivu shares borders with Uganda and Rwanda. The provinces have been experiencing intense insecurity and a worsening humanitarian crisis, with over one million internally displaced people and a continuous efflux of



refugees to neighbouring countries, including Uganda, Burundi and Tanzania.

ETC Response

- Following the official WHO request for ETC support in view of the recent Ebola outbreak in Beni (North-Kivu), the ETC and WHO jointly assessed the ICT needs of humanitarians responding in the affected areas as well as the resources required. This mission finished on 2 September. The ETC is preparing the assessment report for WHO.
 - The ETC supported the UN Organization Stabilization Mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (MONUSCO) in programming and installing a radio repeater in the common Communication Centre (COMCEN) deployed in Mangina, 25 km from Beni. In addition, the ETC trained four radio operators and a WHO technician in programming the new digital radio devices (both HF and VHF).
 - To ensure humanitarians can use the security telecommunications provided by the ETC efficiently, the ETC programmed 60x WHO handheld radios in Beni.
- The ETC deployed Very High Frequency (VHF) and High Frequency (HF) services as well as COMCENs in Kananga (Kasai) and Uvira (South-Kivu). In the Kasai region, the ETC deployed
 - o In Kananga the ETC is offering programming handheld services to United Nations (UN) and Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs).
 - o In Uvira, the ETC completed the deployment of the radio infrastructure and services which are fully operational.
 - o In Lusenda (South-Kivu), the ETC completed the deployment of VHF security telecommunications services to support the Burundian refugee situation.
- In Kasai, the ETC deployed VHF and HF services in Mbuji-Mayi, Kananga and Tshikapa, including a COMCEN. The ETC also trained the radio operators to efficiently man the COMCEN. In Tshikapa, the ETC finalized the deployment of VHF and HF radio services and a COMCEN with trained radio operators.

Planned Response

• As soon as the procured equipment arrives in DRC, the ETC will upgrade the security telecommunications infrastructure in Baraka, Kabalo and Nyuzu.

Challenges

- Volatile security conditions in the affected areas is the main challenge that humanitarians are currently facing.
- Lengthy customs processing times have an impact on the timely impact of ETC services across DRC to support humanitarian operations.



Funding

The ETC received US\$600,000 from the Central Emergency Response Fund - Rapid Response (CERF RR) fund
to further upgrade security telecommunications in Kasai, Sud-Kivu and Tanganyika provinces. The ETC has
received a 3-month extension of the CERF funds until the end of October to complete the project.

Meetings

 The next Global ETC teleconference on the ETC activities in DRC, Central African Republic (CAR) and Nigeria will be held on 3 October 2018.
