ETC Situation Report #41

Reporting period 24/03/2017 to 27/04/2017

These Situation Reports are distributed monthly. The next report will be issued on or around 25/05/17.

Highlights

- The Emergency Telecommunications Cluster (ETC) continues to provide Internet connectivity services for humanitarians in Qayyarah: at the Mercy Hands office in town, and the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) and Danish Refugee Council (DRC) office in Qayyarah Airstrip camp.
- A total of 70 humanitarians have registered to access ETC Internet connectivity services since the beginning of 2017.
- More than 1,308 vouchers have been used by the affected population at United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) Youth Centre and Internet cafe in Domiz camp since the project started in June 2016.

Situation Overview

Military operations in western Mosul continue resulting in increasing numbers of displaced people. Around 530,000 people have been displaced since the Mosul operation began in October 2016. Over the last few weeks, more than half of the 369,000 people displaced from west Mosul have found shelter in camps and emergency sites.

Severe flooding along the Tigris river have negatively impacted access of humanitarian organisations, including the ETC, to Qayyarah in the last week as the main bridge crossings were closed. Humanitarian access to west Mosul was also impacted by the temporary suspension of UN missions to west Mosul due to security threats.

The ETC continues to prepare to provide services at the new priority sites as needed.



Response

- The ETC continues to provide security telecommunications services to the response community in the Kurdistan Region of Iraq (KRI): Erbil, Dohuk, Domiz camp, Sulaymaniyah, Arbat camp and Ashti camp. Internet connectivity is provided at Arbat camp and Domiz camp.
 - An Ericsson Response WIDER kit (a tool to manage and distribute Internet connectivity) is installed in Arbat camp.
- To support the humanitarian response to the Mosul operation, the ETC is providing Internet connectivity at the Mercy Hands office in Qayyarah town, and IOM and DRC offices in Qayyarah Airstrip camp. The team went on mission to Qayyarah to improve the Internet connectivity service there.
 - Security telecommunications (radio) services cover Qayyarah town, Qayyarah Airstrip camp,
 Qayyarah Jad'ah camp and Haj Ali.
 - A WIDER kit is installed at Mercy Hands office.
- The ETC continues to provide Internet connectivity to the affected community in the UNFPA Youth Centre
 and Internet café in the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugee (UNHCR) pre-fab in Domiz camp,
 Dohuk as part of the ETC Services for Communities (S4C) project.
 - A WIDER kit is installed here also.
- The ETC team is now using the portable emergency.lu satellite terminal to share operational information with the Local Telecommunications Working Group.
- The ETC conducted a mission to Arbat camp to install a solar solution to address the power issues.
- The ETC has programmed radios using the new codeplug for staff in WFP, UN Department of Safety and Security (UNDSS) and UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

Planned Response

- The cluster plans to roll out more S4C projects as required.
- The ETC is working on an independent solar power back-up solution to be used in the field where electricity (city power and/or generator) is a problem.
- The planned IHP hub in Hamam al Alil has been cancelled as a new location to the east of Mosul has been identified. Once confirmed, the ETC will be able to deploy Internet connectivity and security telecommunications services for humanitarians.



Challenges

- The lack of funding remains a challenge for the ETC. While the cluster has appealed for US\$2.7 million to carry out its activities in 2017, US\$1.2 million is being sought to cover immediate needs of staffing and equipment.
- As the Mosul operation continues to evolve, the security situation remains volatile across the country.
- Severe flooding along the Tigris is restricting humanitarian access to key sites.

- The next Joint Global ETC teleconference will take place on 10 May.
- The next Local ETC Working Group meeting will take place on 15 May.

Background on the emergency:

On 7 June 2014, heavy fighting between the Iraqi Security Forces (ISF) and the Armed Opposition Groups erupted in Mosul, the second largest city in Iraq. The violence resulted in numerous casualties and the takeover of the entire city by Armed Opposition Groups, including government buildings, Mosul International Airport, and all police and military bases. Tikrit was seized on 11 June by the Armed Opposition Groups. An estimated 500,000 Iraqis had been displaced in northern Iraq within the first week.

With the operation to liberate Mosul escalating, the humanitarian situation continues to worsen. Relief organisations are deploying emergency response teams and mobilizing resources to meet the urgent needs of the affected people.

WFP is leading ETC activities in Iraq in collaboration with UNAMI.
